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the eminent philosopher and classical scholar alexander nehamas presents here a collection of his most important essays on plato and socrates the papers are unified in theme by the idea that plato s central philosophical concern in metaphysics ethics and aesthetics was to distinguish the authentic from the fake the original from its imitations in approach the collection displays nehamas s characteristic combination of analytical rigor and sensitivity to the literary form and dramatic effect of plato s work together the papers represent nehamas s distinct and original contributions to scholarship on plato and socrates and serve as a comprehensive introduction to the thought of these two philosophers in the book s opening section nehamas discusses plato s representation of socrates as a model of authentic human goodness showing that plato s socrates is a more skeptical troubling and individualistic thinker than is usually supposed the papers in the second section form a sustained defense of a new and important understanding of plato s theory of the forms and the evolution of that theory in plato s later writings the third section examines plato s contention that popular entertainment by which he meant greek epic and tragic poetry misleads its audience into a debased life an argument nehamas relates to modern anxieties about television and other forms of popular culture the collection also includes a discussion of plato s use of the dialogue form in his representation of socrates and carefully examines the combination of literary and philosophical elements in his work nehamas argues in the book that plato s specific judgments of what is authentic are often flawed but that his idea of authenticity as the mark of truth beauty and goodness is stronger than many modern scholars have assumed in drawing together nehamas s many influential ideas about plato and socrates virtues of authenticity is a major contribution to the study of ancient greek philosophy

a model of the kind of text one needs for lecture courses the translation is extremely readable and made even more accessible by intelligent printing decisions on dividing the text spacing for clarification etc the notes are kept to a minimum but appear when they are really needed for comprehension and are truly informative and the introduction admirably presents both basic information and a sense of current scholarly opinion s g nugent princeton university

more than eighty years after his death nietzsche s writings and his career remain

disquieting disturbing obscure his most famous views the will to power the eternal recurrence the Übermensch the master morality often seem incomprehensible or worse repugnant yet he remains a thinker of singular importance a great opponent of hegel and kant and the source of much that is powerful in figures as diverse as wittgenstein derrida heidegger and many recent american philosophers alexander nehamas provides the best possible guide for the perplexed he reveals the single thread running through nietzsche s views his thinking of the world on the model of a literary text of people as if they were literary characters and of knowledge and science as if they were literary interpretation beyond this he advances the clarity of the concept of textuality making explicit some of the forces that hold texts together and so hold us together nehamas finally allows us to see that nietzsche is creating a literary character out of himself that he is in effect playing the role of plato to his own socrates nehamas discusses a number of opposing views both american and european of nietzsche s texts and general project and reaches a climactic solving of the main problems of nietzsche interpretation in a step by step argument in the process he takes up a set of very interesting questions in contemporary philosophy such as moral relativism and scientific realism this is a book of considerable breadth and elegance that will appeal to all curious readers of philosophy and literature

neither art nor philosophy was kind to beauty during the twentieth century much modern art disdains beauty and many philosophers deeply suspect that beauty merely paints over or distracts us from horrors intellectuals consigned the passions of beauty to the margins replacing them with the anemic and rarefied alternative aesthetic pleasure in only a promise of happiness alexander nehamas reclaims beauty from its critics he seeks to restore its place in art to reestablish the connections among art beauty and desire and to show that the values of art independently of their moral worth are equally crucial to the rest of life nehamas makes his case with characteristic grace sensitivity and philosophical depth supporting his arguments with searching studies of art and literature high and low from thomas mann s death in venice and manet s olympia to television throughout the discussion of artworks is generously illustrated beauty nehamas concludes may depend on appearance but this does not make it superficial the perception of beauty manifests a hope that life would be better if the object of beauty were part of it this hope can shape and direct our lives for better or worse we may discover misery in pursuit of beauty or find that beauty offers no more than a tantalizing promise of happiness but if beauty is always dangerous it is also a pressing human concern that we must seek to understand and not suppress

a superb translation that captures the rhetorical brilliance of the greek the translation is faithful in the very best sense it reflects both the meaning and the beauty of the greek text the footnotes are always helpful never obtrusive a one

page outline is useful since there are no editorial additions to mark major divisions in the dialogue an appendix containing fragments of early greek love poetry helps the reader appreciate the rich and perhaps elusive meaning of eros the entire introduction is crisply written and the authors erudition shines throughout without a trace of pedantry this is an excellent book that deservedly should find wide circulation for many years to come tim mahoney university of texas at arlington

Plato uses a logic without defining or naming it somewhat as verbs are used in daily life without saying verbs or defining them linguists may define them similarly Plato's logic identifies Plato's logic Plato does not he lives by it the logic in question is used to track down first causes these begin or end causal series of all four of Aristotle's types of cause thus for instance God in the laws is the first mover in a chain of movers so God is the first efficient cause the Republic's form of the good again is the highest authority or order and due to this it is the first formal cause the Symposium's form of beauty is the first final cause that is the ultimate reward the Phaedo's psyche is a first material cause being simple and therefore immortal this is not a logic in Aristotle's sense but luckily that is not the only sense there is Plato's logic is relational not Aristotelian this is because the causes are easiest to interpret as causal relations then the causal relations form series and the series begin or end in forms or gods in this book's formal vocabulary Plato's logic is always of the form $arbc \ zrz$ if the terminus is a god or $arbc \ zrr$ if the terminus is a form all of Plato's writing is not quite like this that is true but his wildest and most characteristic writings are he does admittedly write many other things as well but the core of his philosophy consists of his hyperbolic claims about the forms and gods and so they deserve to be in the limelight the general idea of this book is that Plato's idealistic demands make sense in relational idioms the idealism is not nonsensical or fallacious but rational speculation is a duty not a joke or a sin numerous recent scholars are attacked because they belittle it

of people we will turn out to be and on our chances of leading a worthwhile and happy life in its focus on the question why he considered desires to be amenable to this type of reflection this book explores plato s ethics of desire

the phenomena of television is examined from the historical context and television as an art form to television in various aspects of modern society such as tv in the classroom and on the battlefield

this book traces the development of plato s analogy between craft and virtue from euthydemus and gorgias through the central books of the republic it shows that plato s middle dialogues develop and extend rather than reject philosophical positions taken in the early dialogues

this approach is flawed that such concern with discovering external facts rests on modern assumptions that would have been far from the minds of socrates and his contemporaries this isn't however to accuse socrates of any kind of relativism through careful analysis of the original greek and of a range of competing strands of plato scholarship kirkland instead brings to light a radical proto-phenomenological socrates for whom what virtue is is what has always already appeared as virtuous in everyday experience of the world even if initial appearances are unsatisfactory or obscure and in need of greater scrutiny and clarification
